"If I can do it, so can you!"

"What can I do to change? How do I fix myself?" These were the two questions that motivated Sebastian Kemp to start seeking a new way of life.

Raised by his stepfather, Sebastian grew up playing baseball, basketball and football. He loved sports and they kept him active and busy. He lived in a household filled with lots of other kids, with his mother not present, his stepfather raised him as his own. Money was always tight, but he knew he was loved.

During high school he started down the wrong path with the wrong crowd, and began smoking weed. He was not doing his schoolwork, and his laziness eventually led to his stepdad setting boundaries that Sebastian stepped over. At age 17, he was out on the streets.

Still drinking, he worked hard to get his life back on track and met a woman who eventually become the mother of his two children. At this point, they both had a good job, and an apartment, yet he once again began drinking heavily. Tired of giving second changes, his girlfriend, pregnant with their second child, left along with their first child.

Sebastian was now alone, working and continually drinking which eventually caused him to lose his job – and his apartment. Although he reunited with his girlfriend she gave up and he was once again homeless and alone. It was this last reality that caused him to slip into a deep depression and he finally asked himself "What can I do to change? How do I fix myself?" Sebastian made a call to Behavior Health in Stockton. A good friend also recommended Gospel Center Rescue Mission as a place to get a new start. He floated around for another three months before finally taking the step to come to The Mission, where he met Pastor Tyson. "He showed me love with open arms and made me feel
